"The SLSW team has been really welcoming," she said. "They are so friendly and welcoming and I'm learning so much. I'm looking forward to starting carer assessments and looking at plans for the people who use Shared Lives services.

"Pre-covid I know SLSW had other placements for trainee social workers, so it's good the partnership has started again." Susan, who is going down the Masters level route for her training, has a background in legal work, but a change of circumstance saw her retrain in teaching.

She spent time in adult education teaching English as a secondary language and Maths.

With her daughter having dyslexia, she went on to

support her through her GCSE's and it spurred Susan to work as a Maths teacher in a secondary school. "My daughter did really well and went on to university and I'm really proud," said Susan. "With her growing up, I decided I want to do something different and have a good few years in me yet and decided on social work. "I worked with a mum with learning disabilities and had heard about Shared Lives when I did research on how to support her. It really sparked an interest for me." Susan made the leap to working in social work in children's services, but the pandemic got in the way of her moving on with her career. With life back to normal, Susan is working hard to complete her training and has a further placement in Children's services for 90 days as part of her two-year course. In the future Susan would like

to get involved with the Nora Fry Centre for Disabilities Studies, based in Bristol, which is a leading national centre of excellence for research and teaching, striving to make a positive difference to the lives of disabled people.

"I'm really passionate about people getting the right support that they deserve," she said. We wish Susan all the very best with her course and her journey to become a social worker.

It's great to see Martin learning new skills and getting involved in cooking. Well done to Martin and also to his carers for the encouragement and support.









The event is designed for young people aged between 14 and 21 with a range of support needs who complete one of several routes suited to their abilities.

Leon, who is supported by SLSW Carer Jonathan Bevins, spent the night before the challenge camping at Okehampton Army Camp with



his friends and peers from Mayfield School/College before the big day.

"Most of it was completed in a Delichon All Terrain Buggy, but he got out of the buggy and walk (supported on both sides) the final uphill to the finishing line." said Jonathan.

"You could see the joy on his face at the end and was in serious need of a good rest and sleep."

His SLSW household couldn't

The Jubilee Challenge.
"Watching Leon accomplish
something like The Jubilee
Challenge brings a lot of joy
to all our family as we have
known Leon since he was five
years old and have seen him
overcome many challenges in
life, which will have no doubt
left their mark, but also goes
to show that with the right

care, support and professional input a young person like Leon should never be written off," said Jonathan supportingly. The family has provided fostering respite for him for more than ten years, before talks in 2018 for Leon to move in with Jon's family long term. "Leon convinced us that we should continue caring for him post-18 and so last year the wheels were set in motion to become Shared Lives South West Carers in order that when he turned 18 the transition to adulthood for him would be seamless and continue to be a positive experience for him," said Jonathan.

"As new Shared Lives Carers the greatest difference from fostering has to be the diminished paperwork!! Although it is still a "job" it feels more of a calling and life choice that benefits a wider circle of people than a career, plus we have the knowledge that Leon now has a forever home."

As a household they enjoy lots of outdoor experiences together including holidays. "We now have his all-terrain buggy and can access all those areas which were previously out of bounds for him, such as Dartmoor and wooded walks," said Jonathan. "Last October Leon and I also completed a 22 mile walk to raise money for two sensory rooms at his respite centre and school. He really is an outdoorsy lad!!"

Happy Pride Month!

The month of June is celebrated as Pride Month for the LGBTQ+ Community across the globe.

LGBTQ+ stands for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, plus other related identities.

In this month there are lots of different events and activities that celebrate the influence that LGBTQ+ people have had on the world whilst offering an opportunity for fostering a culture of inclusivity and diversity by celebrating difference and courageousness.

It is also a time to reflect on how far the movement for equal rights has come for LGBTQ+ people, and to highlight what more needs to be done to ensure LGBTQ+ People are treated fairly and without discrimination across society.

The term "Pride" in regards to LGBTQ+ Rights was used in the very first protest march in New York where there were equal rights demonstrations held by the members of the LGBTQ+ community against oppression and homophobia in response to some violent police raids on LGBTQ+ establishments in New York. The police had violently raided the Stonewall Inn – which

was a "bottle club" meaning that the club would run with the idea that members kept their own alcohol at the club and would be paying staff to serve them only. This got around the strict licensing laws at the time which could see establishments lose their liquor licence as they would be seen as a "disorderly house" if they served drinks to known homosexuals. As the Stonewall Inn was raided by Police in June 1969 the police became violent towards the patrons, and instead of people leaving the area quickly before they were arrested as usual, they stayed outside the Inn and started to riot. This led to two nights of rioting in the City of New York and a few days of further protesting against police violence, homophobic laws, and discriminatory societal views. Within a month of these riots the first Pride March took place and this is why Pride month is celebrated in June across the world.

These days Pride month and pride celebrations, although still a protest for equal treatment for LGBTQ+ people, are vibrant and happy events promoting positivity, in which people from the LGBTQ+ community celebrate themselves and shun shame and oppression and acknowledge acceptance and

progress for their community. Pride events are of great importance to show visibility and aid members of the LGBTQ+ community to feel accepted and reassured that it is ok to be different, as although there has been great progress towards equal rights there are still lots of steps to be taken. For example, a recent poll found that the main form of bullying at school is still homophobic in nature with over 75% of teachers witnessing this in their daily lives in secondary school and 45% of teachers seeing this in primary schools.

On a recent UK census over 1.5 million people identified as being Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual or similar in their orientation and roughly 260,000 people identified as transgender or similar. Pride events are attended by millions of people worldwide and last year in 2022 over 1.5 million people attended London's Pride march which celebrated it's 50th anniversary.

There are now over 200 Prides taking place in the UK each year with more towns hosting their own event with every coming year.
